HQ, Twenty-First Air Force (AMC)

Lineage. Established as 23 Army Air Forces Ferrying Wing on 12 Jun 1942. Activated on 18 Jun 1942. Redesignated as: North Atlantic Wing, Air Transport Command on 5 Jul 1942; North Atlantic Division, Air Transport Command on 27 Jun 1944; Atlantic Division, Air Transport Command, 20 Sep 1945. Discontinued on 1 Jun 1948. Consolidated (21 Jan 2026) with the Atlantic Division, Military Air Transport Service which was established on 1 Jun 1948. Organized on 25 Aug 1948. Redesignated as: Eastern Transport Air Force on 1 Jul 1958; Twenty-First Air Force on 3 Jan 1966; 21 Expeditionary Mobility Task Force on 1 Oct 2003. Inactivated on 19 Mar 2012. Redesignated as Twenty-First Air Force on 3 Sep 2025. Activated on 5 Sep 2025.

Operations. Initially, the organization ferried aircraft, but by July 1942, its mission had changed to airlifting personnel and cargo. As an intermediate command echelon beginning in the late

1950s, controlled and supported combat-ready airlift organizations in the eastern United States, the Atlantic basin, Europe, and the Middle East. From 2003, served as an expeditionary task force conducting air mobility operations in support of worldwide contingencies, humanitarian operations, exercises and other missions. Since 2025, it provides direct oversight and support of the Global Air Mobility Support System, world-wide contingency response, and the Expeditionary Operations School preparing mobility forces, equipment, and installations to execute Rapid Global Mobility.


