





Davidson College April 8, 1917

Dear Mother.

It sure looks as if we are going to get a free trip to Europe after all. I just can't realize it tho myself. Therefore I'm not worrying about it any – and I hope you are not any. If we just have to go we just have to go – s why worry?

We are drilling here three times a week – there are two companies. Bob Walker is captain of one co. & Dunlap Roddy is capt. of the other. We are just learning the very first principles of it. At Trinity & Chapel Hill they seemed much more excited than we are – at the former place they drill before breakfast & at the latter after supper. They are going to get an Army officer at Trinity and probably one here.

I enjoyed my little trip last week.

We have five games next week – leave to-morrow for Greensboro - & play Elon again. We play Trinity two games next week. I hope we beat them at least once. We played Charlotte in Charlotte yesterday and we overwhelmed 14 to 3. We made 9 errors & they got 15 hits – which explains everything.

I was a little disappointed in my report – but guess I'll come out pretty good in the end. I am missing a good many classes this month.



D.C. Thursday

Dearest Mamma,

This day has made me happier than any since the war was started. We learned positively that we could come home and get our diplomas. I just hated the thought of not being able to be with you. It made me nervous and worried for I knew you were thinking of and longing for us as we were for you. Sam and I could not have gone into the Camp if you & father had not advised us but now we are in I'm going to do my very best to be one out of the one who get (sic) a commission in Sept. But even while I'm working I shall be praying that peace come and end it all.

Ever since the war started I've been trying to find out if there was any possible chance to serve my country in another way than as a soldier but I could not find any. I asked Dr Sentelle what he would advise me, he said the training camp. Dr Arbuckle said "wait a while." Dr JM & JW McConnell say go. The whole faculty is divided. Dr Martin can hardly sleep for worrying over the question.

Tonight I went over to see Mrs Vinson and Miss Maud. They both would hardly talk of the war. Mrs Vinson doesn't want any of us to go. It will be very hard for us after we go as every one of the boys who go over there except one is going. She just begs us to write regularly and says a letter will never be owed by her. The hour Seniors who have been "her boys" for so long are going in together and get a "loving cup" with an appropriate message of our love on it and give it to her. It will be hard to leave Mother Vinson & Miss Maud. We can never know just how much there (sic) have meant to us as we have never been away from there (sic) influence. She has truly been "Mother" to us here.

"Soc" Chambliss has been called home to go to the camp. He is a boy who does not believe in doing a thing unless he believes in it. Well he is a peace believer and when he was called home by his people it certainly hurt him. I never saw a boy who was so worked up. The last night he was here he was so nervous that he could not sit still and talk. I hope for his sake he is not taken or is conscripted.

Sam and I are planning to leave here Sat. and spend Sunday with the people in Charlotte. Aunt Janie has already asked us down. Then we leave there Monday getting home Tuesday night. That is the way we have thing figured now. We could leave sooner but it would rush Sam so bad that I doubt if he could get ready. I closed Fresh Sab this afternoon, tomorrow I correct the books and then that night get up all back work of which I have very little. I am passing all my work but I will get a written statement assuring this from all the professors. That will cinch my diploma.

There will be at Camp about twenty five or thirty boys from Davidson besides the old men. Stuart Gilchrist, Roy Baron, Joe Roddy, Chief Mullen & several others have enlisted. There are seven from the Chapter here going. This all makes it very nice for us. It will be like moving part of D.C. there. That is one redeeming feature to my mind. Dr McConnell said he never saw a better set of men for officers as was going to Oglethorpe. The standard he said was far above the average in the army now. He asked us to stand up and fight to keep it such and we will. He gave Sam & I lots of helpful advise in the matter.


I hear from Maynard that the Fountains are in N.Y. We will miss seeing them here. When will Guy's people go north. He hasn't said. We do not get to see very much of Guy as he boards away from the rest but I see Maynard regularly as he visits me and I him.

Today they had the funeral of Col Scofield, the old frield (sic) of the student who has had a stone on "Skits Corner" for 40 years. The students sent a floral offering and a good number went. He was the friend of us all and we will miss the "old Col" when we come to get up feeds or to play checkers.



Good night now as the lights have blinked. I am longing to be with you all and that thought has done much to make me restless but I'll see you soon. Love to all



> Fort Oglethorpe Co.6 Training Camp

Dear Mamma,

We arrived her O.K. at 5 oclock this morning and found that the N.C. boys were ready to go out to camp so out we went and were registered & assigned to companies and barracks. Sam & I were separated of course. He went to Co. 12 & I to #6. I'm going to try and change my company so I can get with someone I know. There is no one I know it (sic) this one at all.

In Sam's there is several D.C. boys and in #'s 4,5,7 & 9 are boys. We are not full as yet so I'm hoping to see some one I know before long. Sam B. is in #4 with six or seven Suwanee boys.

We had no trouble getting in at all. All we did was to walk up and shoe our yellow slips and they assigned us to places. Sam & I got separated by one person who went to #12 & let me six.

I never felt so lonely in all my life as I did for an hour or so. Had the same feeling that I had at college the first day there. But I'm being awful (?) to leave the fellows fast so that feeling will leave soon.

We have been measured for uniforms & etc and will get them this afternoon. A good deal sooner than I expected. Tomorrow we will be given our guns and real work begins then.

The food is simple but nicely cooked and plenty of it. Gave us lemonade for dinner, no coffee or tea. It sure did taste good as we had not had any thing since 6:30.


Bob Jones & the rest are all out here. If you want to send any telegrams send to "Fort Oglethorpe C/O Co. 6 Training Camp. This is also our Post Office address.

Men are coming fast now. Every few minutes men come in. Each company has three barracks. Holding 60 men for two & three (each). In this first is company office and rooms for officers. Haven't had time to learn his name or the Lieut's yet.

The first thing they did to me was to put me in a company of men learning the semaphore. We went (sic) put thru this for three quarters of an hour then dismissed. Several of the other companies are drilling now and the whole place is full of visitors.

Work is being rushed right on thru Sunday. If yesterday hadn't been Saturday I'd never know this was Sunday. I guess after things get more settled there will be services out here. I hope so.


Please tell every one Good By for us. We left so suddenly that I felt like I was in a dream. I've just come back from getting my uniform. It fits fine. I feel like a real soldier now. When you send that under-wear, will you send also some tapes to mark our stuff, also that flashlight I left in the ford, it (sic) under one of the seats. Must stop now and go to supper. To:

I sure got a bunch of letters to-day – and they were gladly received. I got about 7 – Father's two letters came. I will se Mr. McCallie Sunday, if I can about my position next year.

We were really worked to-day – we get up now at 5:15 – to bed at 10^{00} P.M. I get plenty of sleep - the food is good and bountiful - I am trying to get my habit regular - so I am in fine physical condition & enjoying it. I know good and well I am better or am going to be better than a lot of these fellows here - so if I do my part - I aught to get something.

To-day we frilled as usual most all morning - both by individual squads - and by Co. Each man in his squad - drilling it in turn - after this drill - the semaphore signaling drill - Then drill in manual of arms. This evening Co. conference by Co. commander. Then "setting up" Exercise.

After supper 2 lectures by different officers to entire camp on "Personal Hygiene & Organization of Army" -

Yesterday - I was vaccinated & also took typhoid vaccine again - I just took 3 doses about 3 months ago @ Davidson - I don't thing the vaccination will take & the other had given me no trouble so far.

I have learned that the committee of the Faculty had awarded me the "Gryphon Medal" @ Davidson - for this year. This medal is given to the man who has done more for the college in his Senior year - all round. I will get it @ commencement with the other medal which will be given - I am delighted over winning it.

Must close and retire - write to us when you have time or get Charlotte or Isabelle to -Getting mail very pleasant indeed -



Co 6 Training Sunday

Dear Father

Please excuse this pencil as I've only a little time to write in. When I wrote last week I thought sure I'd find time to write again maybe before breakfast. There isn't any before breakfast except reveille. They started in on Tuesday and gave us the full force of training. I never knew what work was before now I know it's spelt WORK. We start as (sic) 5:15 in the morning, breakfast at 6:00 between this time there is a half hour of setting up exercise. Then at 7 work begins proper. We drill then until 10, when we have half hour of manual of arms, then half hour of semaphore. Dinner at 12:00. Drill work & instruction starts again at 1:30 and from then until 5:00 we work. Supper at 5:30. Study hour for two hours at 7:30 to 9:30. Taps at 10.

The work has been so far hard as we have not quite gotten used to it. For two days I just thought if I could get a good bed & sleep for 12 hours straight then have a good meal I'd rest content but now I feel better. I'm not at all sore. The to-day has done a lot of good.

Our Company is divided into 17 squads. I'm in the 9th, #2 in order of rank. The way they instructions does on each person has command of the squad for a few minutes each day or is asked certain questions about the commands. The captain had me explaining the manual to our squad. I got it very well. You see the captain has quite a job to handle such a company. But he does it well and we are drilling better & better. He is a West Point man by name of McCunniff, 1st Liut. is Cap Morre U.S.R.


Yesterday at 2 oclock we got off until 10 tonight. We all made a blue streak for town and a good supper and then a movie. There was a dance at the Patten for those who wished to dance, also one at Signal Mountain. Sam & I and two other D.C. boys had supper together & went to the show. This morning Sam & I went to the 2nd Church and I never had such a time trying to keep awake in my life. Every time I stay still now I want to sleep. After church I went out to Signal Mountain & Sam went to see Dr McCallie. Signal Mountain is certainly a beautiful spot. They have a beautiful hotel there, it overlooks the Tenn. River, there is a small lake up there and other attractions but the scenery is the chief factor. Next Sunday I'm going to see Lout Out Mt.


I tried to find a schedule of classes to send you but they are out of print. I'll send one as soon as possible.

Dear Father,


Your letter was received and enjoyed. Mail from home was never received before like mail is now. Here we are shut off from every thing for a week at the time with every minute filled full so it (sic) hard to find time to answer. I'll get some cards & write them on week days at meal time after this and a letter on Sat.

This week the work has been like east, only we are marching & drilling under arms now. This makes it easy to keep in step & makes things snappier. On Thurs, we had a two hour practice hike with light kit. Our Co. went out & got lost and marched ten miles before we got back. You should have seen the big fellow towards the last, they were gone sure. Sat, we had inspection of kits, bunks & arms. That was one of the hardest things I've gone thru. We had to stand at attention for half an hour straight. One fellow fainted. The rest of the days have been filled with platoon, squad & company drilling, bayonnette exercises & signaling in the morning. In the afternoon lecturing & questions on the Interior Guard Manual & the I.D.R. Last Friday Capt Short lectured on sight setting & direction of fire. It was very interesting and instructive. The night before Capt Richardson had given us a lecture on Official Letters & the bookkeeping side of the Captain & Lieut. Job. The night before Gen. Wood spoke to us on Preparedness & the Selective Draft. It was very good.



She says if you are not she is not. She sends her love to mamma. Said she was in Birmingham and couldn't thing of anything but "Auntie" to call Auntie by. I told her Auntie was in Fla at the time, so she felt better. They leave tomorrow for home.

Sat. they arranged us in squads & then the squads in Barracks. I'm in the 9 squad & a good one. All the fellows are fine fellows. Several from Charleston & the rest from N.C. One is a good friend of Frank Halls, Sam's roommate.




Dear Mother.


At present it is raining – and has been for some time – very hard. Consequently we may get out of drill.





Dear Father.

To-day begins our forth (sic) week and it seems like we had been here as many months. The work is becoming more intensive but no harder. Last week was the same was (sic) last week work only more advanced. We are using all the formations of the School of the Company now in drill and before long will take up the battalion. The bayonette & signaling exercises are the same only given faster. At night we study the formations of Out Post, Advance Guards, Patrols & etc in The Field Regulations. The different leaders giving us lectures at night. Friday we had a two hour practice march of eight miles about under full kit. They sure are heavy and before we were back we were soaking wet. They then gave us our first competitive drill. This was going nicely until the rain stopped it. All the commanders expressed great admiration at the way we drilled. Some of it was real fine. Our company was drilled entirely by arm signals, not a word spoken. The rushes from skirmish line we (sic) very pretty and well executed. To-morrow we are going to have a formal Guard Mount. That is one thing I can't see thru yet. Why do we need all that formal stuff.

Sat, Sam, Stuart, Wardlaw & I were met by "Soc" in his car & were taken over the city by him. We enjoyed it very much. Then we went to "Socs" for supper which we enjoyed. They then took us up to Signal Mountain for a dance. Rather, to a dance as Stuart was the only who danced. We went up in their car, a 1913 Lozier and one of the best cars I've ever ridden in. Going up we raced a car and I never saw such running in 2nd gear. We went from 30 to 45 miles an hour in it. Just ran off from everything on the road. After the dance we came back and all stayed at "Socs" for the night. I have seldom enjoyed a day better. It certainly do relieve one to spend a day like that after all the exercise & work we get.

To-day I've spent mostly in rest and walking over the park. The big camps are nearly ready for the recruits and before long every field in the park will be in use as a drill ground.

Ask mamma to send me those old pants of yours I used for hunting also the coast. I can use them for every day here and keep a pair of my new ones for nice.
